If you are away for a Sunday, please bring back a bulletin from the church you visited!

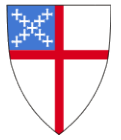

Joseph could no longer control himself before all those who stood by him, and he cried out, “Send everyone away from me.” So no one stayed with him when Joseph made himself known to his brothers. And he wept so loudly that the Egyptians heard it, and the household of Pharaoh heard it. Joseph said to his brothers, “I am Joseph. Is my father still alive?” But his brothers could not answer him, so dismayed were they at his presence.

Then Joseph said to his brothers, “Come closer to me.” And they came closer. He said, “I am your brother, Joseph, whom you sold into Egypt. I will provide for you there—since there are five more years of famine to come—so that you and your household, and all that you have, will not come to poverty.’ And now your eyes and the eyes of my brother Benjamin see that it is my own mouth that speaks to you. You must tell my father how greatly I am honored in Egypt, and all that you have seen. Hurry and bring my father down here.” Then he fell upon his brother Benjamin’s neck and wept, while Benjamin wept upon his neck. And he kissed all his brothers and wept upon them; and after that his brothers talked with him.

Holy Communion

We invite all people to God's Holy table. It's a mystery how God works through common elements to deem them blessed and holy food for those seeking spiritual nurture and grace. There are two ways to receive either standing or kneeling at the altar rail. With open palms, receive the wafer/bread and consume immediately. Another way is to hold the wafer/bread until the chalice is administered and dip just a small edge into the cup. Please make sure fingers do not dip into the wine. If you don't want to receive the wine; simply cross your arms. If you would like to come up in solidarity to those around simply come up and cross your arms. Children are invited to receive, if parents have prepared them. (If you are gluten-free, please tell Krista+ when you come to the rail.)

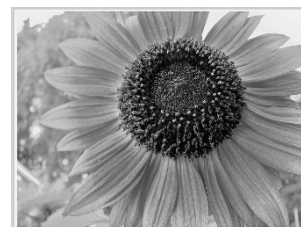

Items especially needed in Aug./Sept.: Current need is **CEREAL, PASTA, such as elbow macaroni, ziti and penne.**

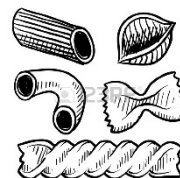
Personal care and paper items are also gratefully received.
